Executive Summary

1. Introduction

Substantial Amendment to the 2024 Annual Action Plan

Kansas State Consolidated Plan

The Kansas Department of Commerce proposes a substantial amendment to the 2025 Annual Action Plan. This amendment outlines several key updates to the use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, emphasizing efficient management of the annual allocation and support for critical community development needs.

1. Community Facilities Small and Large Categories

The Community Facilities Small and Large Categories program enables cities and counties to submit projects for a wide array of CDBG-eligible activities, ranging from small-scale initiatives (e.g., emergency sirens) to larger projects (e.g., new libraries). The program features a reduced match requirement and operates on a rolling application process. The Annual Competition will transition to a rolling deadline, allowing applications to be accepted year-round. Applications submitted by the 15th of each month will be reviewed by the 30th, with award letters issued promptly thereafter. Additionally, a pre-application phase will be implemented to assess project readiness prior to full submission.

2. Community Centers - New Build

The **Community Centers – New Build** program provides funding for the construction of new community centers, with up to \$2,000,000 available per project. A total of **\$12,700,000** has been allocated for 2025. Eligible applicants include all cities and counties that qualify for state CDBG funds, with a **50% match requirement**. Projects must follow one of the approved community center designs, with only minor modifications allowed at the applicant's expense and subject to approval. Additional features such as pools and aquatic elements may be included.

3. Commercial Rehabilitation Program

An additional \$1.5 million from the returned Local Revolving Loan and Micro-loan funds will be directed to the Commercial Rehabilitation program. These funds will support the revitalization of commercial properties within Kansas communities in 2025, with the potential to roll over into the 2025 program year if not fully expended. This program continues to enhance economic growth and the vitality of local businesses. Unused funds from 2024 will bring the total allotment to \$3 million.

4. Re-allocation of Funds from Program Income to Annual Allocation. Existing funds of up to \$15 million from Program Income will be re-allocated to the 2025 Annual Allocation. The funds will be used in the Community Facilities category.

Introduction

The following table displays the anticipated resources to be allocated to non-entitlement areas of Kansas broken down by program type. The 2024 HUD allocations are reflected in the "Annual Allocation" column below. The "Expected Amount Available Remainder of Con Plan" column is a projection of funds to be available for program years 2025-2028. As with previous Consolidated Plans for the State of Kansas, the "Expected Amount Available Remainder of Con Plan" column is generated by multiplying the annual allocation by four, representing years 2-5 of the Consolidated Plan cycle. The relevant years will be adjusted as allocations are made and more precise assumptions can be made on program income.
