Award Types

 Initial 2-year Award: State Loan Repayment participants receive an award in return for a 2-year service commitment at an eligible practice site. All participants start with a 2-year award.

 Continuation Award: After the completion of the initial 2-years of service, eligible program participants can apply to receive an additional award annually for 3 years up to 5 years total.

Have a current permanent Kansas Professional License



Office of Primary Care and Rural Health HPSA Designations

Shortage / Underserved Areas Designations

KDHE's Office of Primary Care and Rural Health is responsible for the evaluation and submissions of health professional shortage areas and medically underserved areas/population designations.

State and federal agencies use these designations to prioritize and direct limited resources to areas with unmet health care needs, including programs for:

- Federally Qualified Health Centers
- Conrad State 30 J-1 Visa Waivers
- Financial Assistance for Health Professionals
- •Medicare Designations for Rural Health Clinics and Community Hospitals
- Medicare Reimbursement for Rural Providers and Telehealth Services



Office of Primary Care and Rural Health J-1 Visa Waiver Program

Kansas State 30 (Conrad) J-1 Visa Waiver Program

The State 30 (Conrad) J-1 Visa Waiver Program assists non-citizen physicians who are international medical graduates in obtaining an H-1B or L-1 visa by waiving the two-year home country residency requirement in exchange for a commitment to practice medicine in a location designated as a health professional shortage area (HPSA). The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) is the designated state health agency for recommending J-1 Visa waivers to the U.S. State Department. Kansas can support up to 30 waiver recommendations per Federal Fiscal Year, October 1 through September 30. Office of Primary Care and Rural Health Kansas J-1 Visa Waiver Program

The Kansas J-1 Visa Waiver program focuses on primary care and meeting emergency medical systems and chronic care needs of underserved populations. Non-primary care specialists may also apply. Evidence of unmet need for non-primary care specialties must be demonstrated by the applicant. Priority will be given in the following order.

- Tier 1, Primary Care: Physicians specializing in Family Practice, General Internal Medicine, General Pediatrics, Obstetrics/Gynecology, Emergency Medicine, or Psychiatry; and will work in the outpatient ambulatory care setting.
- 2. Tier 2 Specialty: Physicians specializing in a primary care specialty (listed above) and will be serving in the capacity as a Hospitalist. Physicians who are board-certified in a non-primary care specialty directly related to the management of time-critical diagnoses (STEMi, Stroke, and Trauma).
- 3. Tier 3 Specialty: Physicians specializing in all other specialties, with preference to specialties that directly supports the coordination of care for patients with chronic disease (e.g., diabetes, heart disease).

The employer's practice site(s) must be located in federally designated Medically Underserved Areas (MUA), or Medically Underserved Populations (MUP), or Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA). Kansas will use its authority to recommend up to ten (10) waivers each year for Tier 1 or 2 physicians to Updated June 2019, Kansas J-1 Visa Waiver Program Guideline.pdf, ADA Review 15-Feb-22 3 practice in areas that do not have the required federal shortage area designations for physicians.

Early History

1987: Commission on Access to Services for the Medically Indigent and Homeless created by Governor Mike Hayden

Indigent care clinics, demonstration grants for indigent health care programs

In 1991, House Bill 2019 (K.S.A 65-229)

• Established three pilot community health clinic programs through local health departments. The pilot clinics were to be modelled after Section 330 clinics, AKA Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs).



Early History Continued...

Ten Proposals submitted by clinics from around the state, nine were eligible.

- Lyon County Local Health Department (15,000-50,000 population)
- Manhattan/Riley County Health Department (50,000-150,000 population)
- Sedgwick County Local Health Department (150,000+ population)



1992 - 2006

- In June of 1994, KDHE announced additional funds for the CBPCC Grant Program, including \$300,000 for new starts and \$200,000 for the expansion of existing clinics.
- In 1996, 1:1 Match requirement was added.
- By SFY 2004, the funding had increased to \$1.5 million.
 - Added language to statute that any unencumbered funds would be reappropriated for the following fiscal year.
- In SFY 2006, funding was increased by \$750,000 to support prescription assistance.
 - Added language about sliding fee scale and eligibility be publicly posted in clinic.



2007 - 2024

- In SFY 2007, \$1,000,000 in funding was added to expand and support additional clinics, bringing the total allocation to over \$3 million.
- In SFY 2008, \$2,000,000 in funding was added, with \$500,000 reserved for expanding access to dental health services.
- By SFY2009, total funding allocated for the Primary Care Clinic Program was slightly over \$7 million.
- SFY 2022 \$12,570,690 distributed via direct clinic awards.
- SFY 2024 \$13,091,772 distributed.



Six Criteria for Eligibility

- 1. The clinic is a not-for-profit or publicly-funded primary care clinic that offers comprehensive primary care health services or dental health services.
- 2. The clinic serves any person regardless of the ability to pay.
- 3. The clinic offers a sliding fee discount based upon household income and family size. Sliding Fee Schedule Policy must be documented and available upon request. Clinic has publicly posted signage and supports to communicate the availability of the sliding fee scale to eligible patients.



Six Criteria for Eligibility

- 4. Ten percent of the clinic's total unduplicated patients at or below 200% of federal poverty guidelines receive a sliding fee scale discount.
- 5. The total unduplicated patients of an eligible clinics must, at a minimum, mirror the disparities present in the county being served.
- 6. Submission of accurate and complete Quality Improvement (QI) data for the previous calendar year. Grantees must also sign a data release with Community Care Network of Kansas so that we can access and use the QI data in the funding formula.



Patient Use Data Required for All Clinics

- Total, Unduplicated all Patients.
- Total, Unduplicated Medical Services Patients Total, Unduplicated Dental Patients.
- Percent of all Unduplicated Patients with "Unknown Income Level" (If percent of unknown is more than 25%, clinics will be expected to provide explanation).
- Percent of all Unduplicated Patients with Income under 100% FPL, Percent of all Unduplicated Patients with Income at or below 200% FPL.
- Total Medical Services Visits, Total Dental Visits.

Formula Funding History

- Approved by Community Care Network of Kansas (CCNK) Board in 2019, implemented in SFY2020.
 - Added program continuity, reporting capabilities and access to increased funding for clinic successes.
- Returning applicants may request any justifiable amount.
 However, the award amount will depend on the funding formula.
- New Applicants may submit a budget request for no more than \$50,000.



Formula Creates a Cost-Per-Patient Adjustment

- 20% Application Score, Number of Unduplicated Patients at or Below 200% FPL.
 - May receive bonus point for primary clinic location in rural or frontier county.
 - High applications scores also equal bonus points.
- 40% Number of Unduplicated Uninsured Patients.

40% Number of Visits for Patients at or Below 200% FPL.

Local Match Requirements

- A clinic's 1:1 match may come from non-cash donations, in-kind services, donated sample medications, or clinic expenses.
- The value of health services provided at no or reduced cost can be used to meet the match requirement.
- Non-cash contributions, such as personnel time, space, commodities, or services used as local match should be stated at an amount agreed upon as the market value and documented in the applicant's accounting records.
 - In-Kind personnel time must follow hourly donation maximums set forth by KDHE Aid-to-Local guidelines



KGMS Application, Budget Request and Data Submissions

- In KGMS, you will complete a narrative-based application, which will be scored on a scale of 0-100 points.
 - Scored by a team of six reviewers.
 - Failing grades of 59 or lower will not receive funding.
- In KGMS you will submit your budget request, including your local match usage plan.
- Via Network Data Hub or New Applicant Packet, clinics will submit their Quality Improvement and Patient Utilization data.
